



Tenses: Past, Present, and Future

1. Present Tense (वर्तमान काल - Vartamaan Kaal)

Key Points:

- Usage: Used to describe actions happening now or routines/habits.
- Sentence Structure:
 - Subject + Verb Root + Ending.
- Endings: Based on the subject and gender. Common endings for "to do" (কংনা karna):
 - o Male Singular: करता (karta)
 - o Female Singular: करती (karti)
 - o Plural (Male or Mixed): करते (karte)
 - o **Plural (Female):** करती (karti)

Examples:

- I eat. मैं खाता हूँ (main khaata hoon) [male] / मैं खाती हूँ (main khaati hoon) [female]
- You write. तुम लिखते हो (tum likhte ho)
- We study. हम पढ़ते हैं (hum padhte hain)

Remember:

- Verb endings depend on the subject's gender and number.
- Use हूँ, हो, हैं, हैं (hoon, ho, hai, hain) to indicate "is/are/am."

2. Past Tense (भूतकाल - Bhoot Kaal)

Key Points:

- Usage: Describes actions completed in the past.
- Sentence Structure:
 - Subject + Verb Root + Past Ending.
- Endings: Common endings for "to do" (কংনা karna):
 - o **Male Singular:** किया (kiya)
 - o Female Singular: की (kee)
 - o **Male/Mixed Plural:** किए (kiye)





Examples:

- I ate. मैंने खाया (maine khaya) [male] / मैंने खाई (maine khai) [female]
- They wrote. उन्होंने लिखा (unhone likha)
- We studied. हमने पढ़ा (humne padha)

Remember:

- Past tense sentences often use the helping word \vec{r} (ne) after the subject.
- Pay attention to gender and number for verb endings.

3. Future Tense (भविष्यकाल - Bhavishya Kaal)

Key Points:

- Usage: Describes actions that will happen in the future.
- Sentence Structure:
 - Subject + Verb Root + Future Ending.
- Endings: Common endings for "to do" (কংনা karna):
 - o **Male Singular:** करेगा (karega)
 - o Female Singular: करेगी (karegi)
 - o Plural (Male or Mixed): करेंगे (karenge)
 - o Plural (Female): करेंगी (karengi)

Examples:

- I will eat. मैं खाऊँगा (main khaoonga) [male] / मैं खाऊँगी (main khaoongee) [female]
- You will write. तुम लिखोगे (tum likhoge)
- We will study. हम पढ़ेंगे (hum padhenge)

Remember:

- Future tense endings vary based on gender and plurality.
- Verbs in future tense indicate intentions or plans for upcoming actions.
