Introduction

- Definition of Patents: Legal rights granted for inventions
- Definition of Traditional Knowledge (TK): Indigenous knowledge passed down generations
- Importance of understanding their relationship

What is a Patent?

- Exclusive rights granted for an invention
- Requirements: Novelty, Inventive Step, Industrial Applicability
- Duration: Typically 20 years
- Examples: Pharmaceuticals, technology, agriculture



What is Traditional Knowledge?

- Collective intellectual heritage of indigenous communities
- Includes medicinal knowledge, agricultural practices, folklore, and biodiversity-related knowledge
- Transmitted orally or through cultural practices



Differences Between Patents and Traditional Knowledge

Feature	Patents	Traditional Knowledge
Ownership	Individual/Company	Community-Based
Duration	Limited (20 years)	Timeless
Protection Type	Exclusive rights	Customary laws
Transmission	Formal (written)	Oral/Cultural



Issues Related to Patenting Traditional Knowledge

- **Biopiracy:** Unauthorized commercial exploitation of TK
- **Lack of Recognition:** TK often not considered in patent laws
- **Lack of Benefit Sharing:** Indigenous communities may not receive compensation
- **Ethical Concerns:** Misuse of sacred or cultural knowledge



The Role of Intellectual Property Laws

- Prevent unauthorized commercial use of TK
- Encourage fair benefit-sharing agreements
- Promote recognition and respect for indigenous knowledge
- Provide a balance between innovation and traditional rights
